ESSENTIAL CHURCH

The word "Essential" means absolutely necessary, extremely important, crucial, or vital. WEEK 1: Defining what the Church is.

Ephesians 2:11-21

Introduction:

We need to differentiate between the Universal Church and a local church. It's important to properly define our terms because if we begin in the wrong place, we'll almost certainly end in the wrong place. The definition needs to be "gathered" from across the New Testament.

A little background

Although "church" has come to mean a building or organization, the original Greek ekklesia meant "a gathering, assembly" and is the basis for our word "congregation." And that is what God designed the church to be—a group of people.

The definition of a "church" as a separate building specifically for worship would have been foreign to the early believers, as they met in homes. When a building was mentioned in the New Testament, it was always in relation to the church that met there. The church was the people, not the building. It is not a denomination; it is everyone who has received the Holy Spirit. And it doesn't grant salvation; it is people, loving and glorifying God and teaching others about a saving knowledge of Christ.

The local church is where the members of the universal church can apply 1 Corinthians 12: encouraging, teaching, and building one another up in the knowledge and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ¹.



WEEK 5: The importance of Unity.

Ephesians 4:1-6

Introduction:

This passage makes it clear that it is not our job to manufacture unity in the church. The Holy Spirit does that as people allow Him to work in and through them. Our job is to do all that we can to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the "bond of peace." The fact is, once a church body forfeits this unity because of sin (pride, selfishness, division, etc.) there is little hope for that body until it is corrected. Disunity is a sickness in the Body that only grace, repentance, forgiveness, and a shared sense of mission and purpose can restore.

Tuned to another standard

A W Tozer once wrote: "Has it ever occurred to you that one hundred pianos all tuned to the same fork are automatically tuned to each other? They are of one accord by being tuned, not to each other, but to another standard to which each one must individually bow".

A diverse church is not made of 100 pianos, but of a group of individuals each unique yet all in tune with Christ Jesus. The harmony of this unlikely combination should be such that the unsaved are drawn to the fullness of the Gospel.

God has not set unity as a primary pursuit for His Church. Rather, it is a secondary matter that comes into expression as His people primarily seek a much higher and greater objective - that of conformity to Jesus Christ.

WEEK 2: The Mission of the Church.

Matthew 28:18-20

Introduction:

The mission of the Church in every age, nation, and culture is to make disciples. That doesn't mean that the local church cannot be involved in various programs, but it does mean that nothing the church does can detract from that single great calling.

Keep the Focus on the Mission

The word mission comes from the Latin words mitto (to send) and missio (sending). So mission implies that someone has sent something to accomplish a task. In other words, God has sent the church to accomplish a task.

While few Christians would deny that making disciples is part of the mission of the church, many Christians still cannot seem to agree on what exactly the primary mission of the church is. So while they may include disciple-making, they also elevate other things like environmental stewardship and social justice causes to the same level or above the primary mission Jesus gave us.

We miss the mark when we take good things and make them primary things. The mission of the church must be focused on keeping the main thing the main thing².

Jesus sent us to go to all nations to make "More and Better" disciples by baptizing new believers and teaching them how to grow in the faith and be disciples who make disciples.

WEEK 4: Don't just attend church. Be the Church.

1 Peter 2:4-12

Introduction:

As Christians we are commanded to attend church, but that should mainly be driven by our identity as Christians. We ARE a royal priesthood and a holy nation. Therefore, we should do all that we do out of who we are in Christ. From here we are to be the church and not just attend church. We are not consumers. We are contributors. We are not observers. We are participants. All of us.

"Drive-in" church?

There's nothing unusual about cars pulling in to church parking lots on a Sunday morning. But this past year, many church goers have remained in their vehicles after arriving due to Covid restrictions.

But when we worship as part of a community, God shows us how we've been incorporated into something much bigger than our own self - we've become part of the body of Christ. In community, we grow closer to God and to each other than we ever could alone.

It's possible to attend a "drive-in church" even if you leave your car and sit in a building on Sunday mornings. Every church has people who show up just after the service has started and leave a few minutes early. But worship is more than a place and a certain time. Worship involves a vibrant community of living stones joined together in Christ. True worship binds believers together as they experience abundant life with each other⁴.

- 2. What are your greatest hesitations or obstacles to making more and better disciples of Christ? How does the Great Commission itself help you to overcome them?





WEEK 3: Connecting the Mission with our Methods. Matthew, 1 Corinthians 9:19-23, Acts 17

Introduction:

Paul teaches us that we must be willing to engage people where and how we find them. That means that the love of Christ needs to be incarnated in us and the Gospel message needs to be contextualized so that the timeless truth is understandable to the hearer. We need to consider the difference between our biblical convictions and our personal/corporate preferences (receive, redeem, or reject elements from culture).

Our identity is found in our role in the body of Christ

God clearly does not use culture or ethnicity as a reason to exclude people from His kingdom. In fact, He seems to delight in the diversity of people who bring Him praise. Paul was an expert at taking on whatever cultural practices were necessary in order to effectively share the gospel. In fact, in Athens, Paul referenced the Athenians' "unknown God" and quoted their "own poets" (Acts 17:23 and 28). These examples show that differences in culture can be celebrated and appreciated as displays of God's creativity in the many diverse ways He is glorified.

The God of Scripture and His Word are the only source of truth in this world and people are not to be deceived by cultural or religious relativism. The God of the Bible is the only true God and He created and loves all people from all cultural backgrounds. We are free to enjoy that diversity when our identity in Christ is properly prioritized³.
